

God's Mission in the World Has a Church

I first encountered the statement at a meeting I attended at the "Star of the North" retreat centre in St. Albert, Alberta. I don't even remember what meeting it was, but the speaker was Steve Willey. Steve Willey did not come up with the statement, he was repeating it from a book written by someone else. The statement resonated with me and continues to do so. "God's mission in the world has a Church".

There have been lots of meetings since then, and quite a few of them have had, if not as the main topic, then certainly in the background, a concern for the future of the church - the Comprehensive Review, Pastoral Care discussions and a workshop, visits from our Moderator, Joint Needs Assessment committee work, Presbytery meetings, Pastoral Oversight meetings, Worship Committee, CLAM, Affirm, Outreach and Christian Development meetings. Different agendas, but some of the same background.

We are currently embarked on another set of meetings - our own version of a needs assessment - to discern some future direction for ourselves as a community of faith.

All of the meetings I have listed, and the ones in which we are encouraging people to consider in our own review, have an assumption behind them that is often not questioned, but which really forms the basis for everything else that we do.

And what is that assumption?

That we have an attractive mission. That there are good reasons why people would want to be a part of who and what we are. That the purpose and value of the community is a given and that what is missing is the right question to ask, the right words to say, the right advertising campaign, the right packaging, that would demonstrate the goodness of who we are and what we do, and bring people in, in droves.

But what if our assumption is wrong? What if, despite our best efforts to attract, to frame the questions in just the right way, to say the precise words, and wrap it up in the perfect packaging, people just aren't interested anymore?

Of course there will always be a few, and even more than a few, who will remain interested, but we all know that we are not all alike. We know that some things go viral for some reason and other things that seem to be just as compelling, or inviting, or interesting, or purposeful, are left to be consumed by just a small audience.

And so, yes, there are good reasons why people would want to be a part of who and what we are – but perhaps they are all already here, or perhaps we are seeing them not in droves, but in the people who come by for a while and then move on, or drop in and receive what they need for a while before they leave and return again at some point in the future. Should we even aspire to attract people in droves? Could we handle it? Would it change us too quickly? Would the time between

invested resources and return on investment be too long?

I don't have answers to all these questions. I'm not even sure I have answers to many of these questions.

What I do know is that the statement which gives title to this article is one which we need to keep considering.

It is not our mission. God has a mission. Do we believe it? And if we believe it, then what do we do? I wish it was easy, but it's not. It involves some careful listening, some wise discerning, some hard questions, and difficult answers. We have resources. We have faith. We have connection. Do we have the openness? Do we have the courage? What is God's mission in this place for this time? How sure are we in stating it?

We have a church - let's make it ready to receive direction.

Committees and interested members for 2016/17 will be presented at the Annual Congregational Meeting scheduled for May 29th. Additional help is needed on all committees.

Pastoral Care Workshop

The Community Life and Membership Committee (CLAM) was pleased that Rev. Kirk Tastad of Holy Family Lutheran Church was able to work with us as an interested but outside facilitator in a Pastoral Care Workshop on January 16th, just before Kirk and his family left Yellowknife and Holy Family for a new call in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan. A total of ten people, including the members of the CLAM committee and other interested members of the Yellowknife United Church congregation attended the workshop and spent several hours defining and naming the pastoral care that occurs as part of the work and program of our faith community.

The workshop generated lots of interesting and insightful conversation, along with some helpful ongoing discussion about ways that pastoral care can happen even better in our faith community. Further discussion and planning has taken place at CLAM meetings since the workshop and follow-up sessions are in the planning process.

Both of the above processes are a direct result of recommendations that were offered in the report from the most recent Northern Lights Presbytery Oversight Visitation.

The Canadian Diabetes Association's 'Clothesline'

In the fall of 2015, YKUC was approached by the Canadian Diabetes Association (CDA) asking if we would be interested in partnering with them to bring the 'Clothesline' to Yellowknife.

'Clothesline' refers to placing red clothing collection bins within the city. With the support of congregation members we rolled out the program in January. Not the warmest time of year to launch a new initiative but the project has been warmly received by residents of Yellowknife!

Red collection bins have been placed at:

- Trevor's Independent
- Multiplex
- Ruth Inch Pool

We are hoping to have a fourth bin at the YK Coop in the near future.



Volunteers check the bins on a weekly basis to collect the donations and they are brought to our storage trailer in Kam Lake. When the trailer is full, the CDA will arrange for it to be shipped south and YKUC will receive money based on each pound of clothing collected. The funds raised from this project will be used for the local church and its initiatives.

Christian Development Committee Happenings

Caring Connections



Volunteers from across the City of Yellowknife provide a weekly Foot Washing and Free Socks Program for the homeless.

The Program is offered at the Salvation Army on Wednesday evenings at 7:00 p.m. Each foot washing station provides guests with a soak to help ward off significant health concerns.

Volunteers spend time with each guest during the foot clinic to listen to each person's story, offer support and empathy, and share laughter. Often there are between 12 to 15 guests served each week.

Each guest is provided with free socks which is a wonderful benefit for the participants. We must remember many are walking around all day; having healthy feet is important for these guests.

In addition to the free night clinic, on Thursdays at 1:00 p.m. a Doctor comes on site at the Salvation Army to address any follow-ups volunteers recommend for more serious foot concerns.

The Outreach Committee has been very busy! Committee members have participated in four projects over the last year.

Warm Feet for the Street Sock Project

This project, which helps men who are living on the street celebrate Christmas, continues to be well supported by the congregation. We received more donations than usual from the congregation this year including 35 filled socks, plus \$440 in donations (including \$200 from the youth group). The sock filling party at Joanne and Matt's house was fun and productive, especially because of the enthusiastic efforts of our junior Outreach Committee members- Jamie, Anya and Sarah. In the end, after filling 50 socks, we had several extra pairs of socks left over which were donated to the Caring Connections Foot Washing program. Thank you to everyone who donated or helped with the Warm Feet for the Street project; it is greatly appreciated by those who receive the socks.

Coldest Night of the Year Walk

The United Church team, the Arctic Snow Bunnies, led by our fearless leader, Janice Daly, once again had fun and raised needed funds in the 3rd annual Coldest Night of the Year Walk on February 20th. Our small but mighty team of seven raised \$1,715 with the help of 35 generous donors. All the money this year will go to renovating the kitchen at the Salvation Army. Thank you to Janice Daly, Elizabeth and Emily Brace, Sarah and Kathryn Walker, Lindsay and Mackenzie Chiasson and Arlene and Kieran Cliffe-Phillips, and to all the generous donors, many of whom are United Church members, who helped contribute to this successful event.

Refugee Sponsorship

We remain committed to the refugee sponsorship of Abdi Adan Adow. Our co-sponsor is not currently in Yellowknife but remains committed to the sponsorship as well. After a long wait, there was movement on Abdi's case in 2015, including immigration interviews and medical exams. However, we are still waiting for Immigration to make a decision on the case. In the meantime we are exploring ways of providing support to Abdi, if and when he should arrive in Yellowknife.

We have also been involved in discussions with a Yellowknife resident about another possible co-sponsorship of refugees. This is in the information-finding stage.

Gardens

Every year the youth group plant and tend the deck boxes on the NUP deck for the enjoyment of NUP residents. This year we grew our gardening efforts with a new initiative - the Intergenerational Garden Project.

The goal of this project is to provide a space to garden for both NUP residents and students at Mildred Hall. A garden committee was formed to include members from Mildred Hall School, YK 1, NUP, the Outreach Committee, Ecology North and residents from NUP. With funding from the department of Industry, Tourism and Investment, soil, lumber, manure, compost, tools and plants were purchased. Thank you to Kirby Marshall and the Rotary Club for constructing seven garden boxes in the Mildred Hall playground. Students and teachers from the school, as well as two NUP residents as well as staff and residents from Lynn's Place planted vegetables in the boxes. Over the summer the boxes were watered by volunteers from the church, NUP residents, Lynn's Place staff and residents and a couple of Mildred Hall students. The gardeners and students feasted on a bountiful harvest over the summer and in the fall.

Thanks to Clark Builders, ten more boxes were constructed in August and most of the boxes were filled with soil. This year planning has already started for this summer's garden. We are planning to have the ten new boxes planted and hope for more involvement from the Mildred Hall parents and also NUP residents, as there is lots of space to garden. We will also be making the garden more accessible by installing a waist high garden box for those with physical disabilities.

Walking the Labyrinth

The theme of walking has been prominent recently at Yellowknife United Church. Members of the congregation's worship committee created a temporary labyrinth in the sanctuary on several occasions, including the winter solstice, and the spring equinox. The event was promoted as an ecumenical opportunity to engage in the venerable form of walking prayer, or meditation, or whatever tradition people wished to attach to the experience.

With masking tape, candles, strings of white LED lights, and some ethereal musical selections, the organizers created a powerful transient experience. The room also offered an arbor for candle lighting and prayer, as well as a table and supplies at which drawing, writing, and mandala colouring, happened in response to the insights gained while walking the labyrinth. Greeters offered a brief welcome and orientation to the space, with some suggested guidelines to help newcomers get the most from the labyrinth experience. During the evening of the winter solstice labyrinth, soup, bread, coffee and squares were offered to take the chill off, and to entice people to drop in on their way home from work and not have to worry about their dinner.

Each event attracted a number of people from the broader community who heard about it and were intrigued. Many had never walked a labyrinth before, and others were old hands. Feedback was very positive, and participants appreciated the experience.

Even local Cubs and Scouts who meet in the sanctuary had a chance to use the labyrinth the day after the equinox, and by all accounts they also enjoyed it.

Organizers of the labyrinth were invited to present at an event at the local museum in January. An evening of Pecha Kucha talks on the topic "Why we walk" was built around the NWT Recreation and Parks Association's Annual Walk to Tuk campaign. Yellowknife United Church was invited to present on the topic of walking for reasons of a spiritual nature. Other talks included walking for tourism, environmentalism, activism and awareness, solidarity, and the event was the first Pecha Kucha night in Yellowknife. Twenty slides, each for only twenty seconds, makes for focused and refined presentations, which were quite engaging, and are available on YouTube. In an increasingly secular world, it was affirming and inspiring to be invited to participate in the series of talks.
