#### Yellowknife United Church Choir

Music is an integral part of worship services. A choir shares their faith through the music they sing and supports congregational singing. Participation in choir ministry provides another relationship within the church community.

One of the keys to our success is our flexibility. With the busy lives that many of our choir members lead, practicing anthems over a number of weeks provides opportunities for those choir members who may not be able to attend each week. Our choir members love to sing and enjoy the comradery within our choir family.

## Everything is on the Table

At the 2012 General Council meeting in Ottawa, a Comprehensive Review Task Group was formed to gather input on the future of the church. From the very beginning the Task Group let it be known that their review was one which could be characterized by the statement "Everything Is On the Table". The Task Group has been consulting with members and adherents of congregations, presbyteries and conferences throughout The United Church of Canada, gathering information and visions of how we need to change and re-form in response to the changing demographic, cultural and financial situation that faces the church in this time.

The Task Group released its report to the 2015 General Council on Tuesday, March 3<sup>rd</sup>. This report will be a resource for discussion and consideration between now and the 2015 General Council in Cornerbrook, Newfoundland in August. The report and the changes it outlines will form the major theme of the General Council and will have a profound effect on the future of The United Church of Canada.

Hopefully you have been aware of this "everything is on the table" review group and its work. Prior to this summer's General Council, there will be a number of ways in which the wider church can offer feedback, analysis and response to the report and the changes it recommends. #### Richness Through Reading

About three years ago, I met my good friend, Molly. During our first coffee date, we discovered that we were both Christians who had become frustrated with what we viewed as traditional Christianity and "the Church". Neither of us had had a church to call home for a number of years. What we did have, though, was a shared love of reading, and Molly introduced me to several Christian authors who examined the Christian faith in a meaningful way. We would pick books to read and then get together to discuss them. These books challenged me and helped my faith to grow richer.

In October, 2014, my husband, Peter, and I completed an incredibly stressful move to Yellowknife. It was our second move in six months, and it had been a very challenging year. Out of a need to feel more connected to our new community, we sought out a church, and I believe God lead us to Yellowknife United Church.

Due to an injury, I spent the majority of 2014 recuperating at home, which took an enormous toll on my mental health. I felt extremely isolated and alone in our new city. I missed having meaningful conversations with people. I also wanted to read more books by real people with a real faith that challenged me, and I wanted to discuss them. I suggested a book club to a couple of ladies one Sunday. Their enthusiasm encouraged me, and it was suggested I talk to Barb Paquin from the Christian Development Committee, who was equally enthusiastic.

Our first book club meeting was on January 29<sup>th</sup>, 2015, where we discussed "The Red Tent" by Anita Diamant, a fictionalized telling of the life of Dinah, daughter of Jacob. In February, we challenged ourselves by reading "Zealot: The Life and Times of Jesus of Nazareth" by Reza Aslan, a book that discusses the historical Jesus. This month, we look forward to some lighter reading with "The Year of Living Biblically: One Man's Humble Quest to Follow The Bible as Literally as Possible" by AJ Jacobs.

I am extremely grateful to Barb Paquin for supporting this idea and becoming my partner. Not only has she suggested some fun ideas and excellent titles to read (as well as ensuring we have a room to have Book Club every month), she has provided some incredibly tasty snacks! I am also thankful to each person who has come to the meetings each month, and I so look forward to upcoming meetings!

## International Anti-Homophobia Day Film Night at NUP

In June of 2013 Yellowknife United Church completed a four year process of learning, exploration and discernment and voted to become an Affirming Ministry, joining many other United Churches in Canada.

Voting to become an official Affirming Ministry was only the first step on the path. Now we are called, as a congregation, to persistently work on becoming more inclusive and welcoming to lesbian, gay, bisexual, transsexual, two-spirited, queer and questioning individuals in our services, our physical space, and our presence in the community of Yellowknife.

One of the ways we will be doing that this spring is by celebrating International Anti-Homophobia Day with a movie night at NUP on Saturday, May 9<sup>th</sup>. We are thrilled that NWT Pride, the group that organizes the Pride Festival, has agreed to partner with us at this event. The plan is to open with a musician or two, have two or three films, and refreshments, as well as some information tables. As the only official Affirming Ministry in Yellowknife, we have an important role to play in starting a public conversation about sexual orientation and the church. We are arranging to show Love Free or Die, an award winning documentary about Gene Robinson, the first openly gay man ordained as a bishop. We also plan to show some shorter films on an LGBTTQ theme.

The format for this type of "supper church" is still in the planning stages with the expectation that those who are part of the gathering community will play a significant role in how the gatherings will unfold. In recent years, fresh expressions of Christian community and Christian worship have been springing up in many places. These new Christian communities have developed in response to very busy lives, a mistrust or disinterest in too much organization, and wide circles of social connection mediated by technology and face to face encounters.

Kirk Tastad, the pastor of Holy Family Lutheran Church, must be given credit for the idea to start this northern and Yellowknife version of an "emerging faith community", but it has been a project that has been fully supported and participated in by Peter as a partner. We look forward to how this fresh expression will get lived out in the months to come. We will be meeting once a month, on the last Sunday of each month - continuing into the summer. 4:30pm to 6:30pm. Stay tuned for more details.

## **Prayer Writing Workshop**

The Worship Committee has arranged for a Prayer Writing Workshop on Saturday, March 21st beginning at 11:00 am. Lunch will be included. The workshop will be facilitated by Ray McGinnis, a former national staff person with The United Church of Canada. Ray has skills in helping people "Write from the Heart" He has developed workshops that help people to write Psalms - sacred poetry based on personal experience, Prayers in response to spiritual quest and response to the presence of grief.

The opportunity to host this workshop has come at a good time. Several people have indicated that they might be willing to prepare Prayers for worship, but that training or examples of how to do that would make it easier to volunteer. This is your chance. There will be a small charge for the workshop to help cover costs, but we don't want the price to be a barrier to participation.
